

### Welcome to the festive final NMC SW Newsletter of 2023.

The challenges we faced at the start of this year, are very similar to those we face going into 2024; a milder, but significantly wetter, winter period.

In recent times, our team has had to deal with unprecedented levels of rainfall and flooding, and the inevitable strain this creates on our existing road infrastructure. Fortunately, we continue to provide a swift and effective response to these events when they arise; while continuing to identify and develop long-term solutions to tackle these issues.

These weather events are a reminder of the impact of climate change on the road network, and in 2023, we have taken significant steps to support Amey's commitment to reduce our greenhouse gas emissions and reach net zero on the South-West contract by 2032.

In August 2023, our contract introduced 13 electric VW ID.3 vehicles, with a range of between 250 and 270 miles as part of our journey to net zero. 68.3 percent of our car and van fleet (below 3.5T) are now ultra low emission vehicles.

This key milestone was reached 20 months ahead of schedule, but also exceeds the 50% target set for 2025. This year we also installed 26 brand new AC and 2 DC Electric Vehicle charging points at the Polmadie depot in Glasgow, with a similar initiative planned for our Ayr depot. These installations will future proof Amey's fleet and plant capabilities.

Going into 2024 our primary concerns are ensuring the continued safety and reliability of the South-West Trunk Road Network for all road users, and protecting our workforce by ensuring they return home safe and sound at the end of the working day.

It only remains to wish all our customers, stakeholders, staff, and suppliers a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year and to thank you all for your continued patience, understanding, and support.


### Irvine Mende



# Rada Expo Scotland 2023

This year, Scotland's largest road, transport and mobility focused event, Road Expo, took place at Glasgow's Scottish Event Campus (SEC) on Tuesday 28th November and Wednesday 29th November 2023. This two-day event, in partnership with Transport Scotland, is colocated with Bridges Scotland and brings together Scottish Local Authorities, Government, and Commercial Suppliers.

The event opened with an address from the Minister for Transport, Fiona Hyslop who gave an inspiring speech on Scotland's ambitions for the transport industry and the Scottish Government's 20-year transport strategy. Both events then proceeded with insightful talks from experts, including three Amey employees, who demonstrated solutions to allow these ambitions to be met, with a great concentration on climate change and achieving net zero.


Day One concluded with a presentation from Amey's Innovation Project Manager, Lauren SeBlonka. Partnered with Scott Walker, Asset Services Manager of North Lanarkshire Council, Lauren spoke of the ADEPT Live Labs 2, Centre of Excellence for Decarbonising Local Roads UK project. The principle focus of this project is to establish innovations in decarbonised roads materials and trial them in Scotland. This will be achieved through the creation of a digital knowledge bank where innovations can be shared and grow. The Centre of Excellence will be a source that Local Authorities and

Private, Public, and Academic sectors can utilise to come together to accelerate the implementation of low-carbon materials.

"I was delighted to introduce the Scottish road sector to the Centre of Excellence for Decarbonising Roads at Road Expo Scotland, a Live Labs 2 project that Amey is delivering in partnership with North Lanarkshire Council, Transport for West Midlands and Colas to accelerate the transition to net zero. Through our partnerships spanning public, private and academic sectors, we are creating a live trial ecosystem, carbon evaluation process and online knowledge bank to enable material innovation to flourish, and we look forward to working alongside Scottish local highways authorities to achieve this." - Lauren SeBlonka, Innovation Project Manager



Nominated by Amey's George Robertson, the Brightest Star supports bereaved families and was founded in memory of Jack Kennedy who suddenly passed away six days before his 6th birthday from an Adenal virus (cold and flu) that attacked his heart. When Jack fell ill, there were no beds available in Intensive Care at Yorkhill Childrens Hospital, so he had to be transferred to Edinburgh's Sick Kids hospital. Due to the amount of equipment and three paramedics required at the scene, there was

not enough space for Jack's parents to travel in the ambulance beside him. This was over an hour and half that they couldn't spend with their son in his final hours.


After many years of fundraising, in 2018, the Brightest Star funded a family ambulance that can accommodate parents with enough space for the



### 2for2 Challenge: Amey staff conquer Scotland's two highest peaks in aid of Cancer Research UK

Two Amey employees from the North-East trunk road team climbed Scotland's two highest peaks in 22 hours to raise money for Cancer Research UK.

Principal Construction Manager Stephen Pilkington and Journey Time Reliability Coordinator Ryan Newman took on Ben Macdui and Ben Nevis as part of the Amey 2for2 Challenge. The 2for2 Challenge ran during October 2023 and its basis was to fundraise in the theme of 2s, to coincide with our second, two-year partnership with CRUK.

Stephen and Ryan started their challenge at Scotland's second highest mountain, Ben Macdui, with an elevation of 4,295 feet (1,309 metres), on Friday 27th October at midday.

On completion they drove from the Cairngorms to Fort William, grabbed a few hours sleep and then set off to complete Ben Nevis, with an elevation of 4,413 ft (1,345 metres) on Saturday 28th before 10am.

The duo reached the summit of Ben Nevis by 9.33am, completing their 22 hour challenge with 27 minutes to spare. Ryan said: "The weather throughout was relentless. On the first climb we were both absolutely soaked, and the winds were strong enough to knock us off balance, but we managed to get up and down on Ben Macdui.

"Waking up in the early hours of Saturday morning to say that both our legs were sore would be an understatement.

"Again the weather did not let up, but by reminding ourselves of the cause and how much money we raised, we were able to complete the challenge and reach the peak of Ben Nevis where the winds at the top were upwards of 80mph.

"It was a great feeling and we completed the challenge in 21 hrs and 37 minutes."

A huge congratulations to Stephen and Ryan for completing this massive feat, raising £1,355.42 for the charity.
